Throughout this sermon series we have been focusing our hearts and energy on moving toward what is good, right and true. We can always choose to turn more toward Christ. Last Sundays Sermon- "Seek Life" Series Sunday, January 24, "Forgiveness: Peace with the Past"

Nearly 3 yrs. ago, during my Sabbatical time I visited 8 different churches and it was a great gift & learning experience; there was a lot to see and think about.

At one of the eight churches, during what became an import part of the sermon, one Pastor, in a matter of fact sort of way, said,

"Some of you don't like each other, don't want to be near each other, or work together, but you're here and that's good."

And for those moments there was a deafening silence, you could have heard a pin drop.

Yet, in that silence, you heard the sounds of a demilitarized zone of unforgiveness.

It reminded me of how difficult a thing forgiveness can truly be.

Impetuous Peter, quick to speak voices that very reality.

"Lord, how many times shall I forgive? "

Peter, filled with a generous spirit, says, up to 7 times?

The Rabbi's taught 3 times, but a 4th time you did not forgive,

"He who begs forgiveness from his neighbor must not do so more than three times."

"If a man commits an offense once, they forgive him; if he commits an offense a second time, they forgive him; if he commits an offense a third time, they forgive him; the fourth time they do not forgive.

Three times was the standard; Peter was generous, 7 times.

But Jesus says 77 times; there's no reasonable limit to forgiveness. Peter's face falls, and the disciples are stunned.

When the disciples asked Jesus to teach them to pray he teaches them the Lord's Prayer. And in that prayer, Jesus prays,

Forgive us our debts as we also have forgiven our debtors.

Forgive to be forgiven.

Matthew 5:7 Blessed are the merciful, for they shall obtain mercy.

James 2:3 "For judgment is without mercy to one who has shown no mercy."

Divine and human mercy go hand in hand; inextricably linked.

Forgiveness is the deepest secret that characterizes the love of a follower of Jesus.
