THE PASTOR'S CORNER Roy Backus, Transitional Pastor

Art Pepper is my model when it comes to the alto saxophone. He was one of the founders and leaders of the West Coast (Cool) Jazz sound of the 1950s. His amazing, full, round sound and crisp, clear, brilliant virtuosity is breathtaking. Although he should be a household known saxophonist name of today, he is often overlooked. His drug and alcohol dependencies led him into prison several times, and he spent a great deal of time in California state rehabilitation facilities. His autobiography entitled Straight Life (1979), by Art and Laurie Pepper, tells a clear story of the day to day difficulties and the human price great gift and addiction. Broken relationships were the norm in his life. It is amazing that he succeeded in spite of himself.

My favorite Art Pepper recording set followed his third rehabilitation. It was recorded at Fantasy Studios, Berkeley, CA, in 1979 (the Art Pepper Today session) with Stanley Cowell, Cecil McBee and Roy Haynes. My absolute favorite jazz alto saxophone number is Pepper's rendition of "Patricia" on this album. (You can listen to it on YouTube.) The power, the subtlety, nuance, phrasing, fluid 32nd note passages, and creativity are all demonstrated in this one take masterpiece.

In his autobiography is the following passage about his composition.

"During a break, Stanley (Cowell) was fooling around at the piano, and he started playing a gorgeous ballad. A few people looked up, because it was so pretty. Art, in all innocence, remarked that it was really nice, what was it? He probably hadn't listened to it for more than thirty years. When Stanley said that it was Art's tune, "Patricia" (written for Art's daughter), and offered that he liked it, Art decided to play it.

"They all went back into the studio. Art suggested that they do just a bluesy sort of coda, a long tag at the end. He looked dubiously at the guys, not sure whether they knew what he was talking about. They played the tune, and then Cecil McBee, the bassist, carried them into a gorgeous, funky, perfect ending. They finished, came into the studio, listened to the playback. Wow. Impressed silence.

"Roy Haynes broke it. To Art: 'Where did you say you were from?'" Art: 'Gardena, California.' "Roy: 'Is that South Gardena?'"

Learning the story behind the song and the one take recording is outlandish. The deeper story of Pepper not recognizing his own song, written for his estranged daughter, brought home the price we pay when we let other things get between the way we deal with one another. At the same time, I can't help but think that there was a rescue of his heart, his soul in the most powerful ballad he ever play. Haynes teased him about the powerful blues, soul feeling which Pepper expressed. I like to believe it was his sober attempt to convey the deep, almost inaccessible, sorrow and hope the only way he could. I think we all have at least one more best statement of love.
