THE PASTORS CORNER, Roy Backus, Transitional Pastor

When I was assigned to the 81st Army Band at Fort Sheridan, I was quickly immersed into the ethos and practices of the Upper Midwest. (You have to remember that I grew up in Texas with all the Southern traditions which directly shaped my view on society.)

The first basic function of the band was recruitment. Most members of the band were draftees, and we were all surprised when the Army recruiters would follow us around and have conversations with the juniors and seniors in high school. Evidently we were very productive in our influence on high school students and their families.

I don't remember how many civilian centered parades, concert band concerts, jazz band gigs, politicians' background music, and national holiday everts we played. But I do remember my first Memorial Day gauntlet of parades. We marched 5 parades in 1973. It was a long day, and the communities were truly excited and celebrated Memorial Day.

This celebration confused me, not because I wasn't thankful for my country, our history, the blessings bestowed upon us, etc. No, growing up in Texas meant that we didn't celebrate Memorial Day. At 22 years of age, I asked Dad, what's so important about this Memorial Day up here? He explained that Memorial Day was established by the Union following the Civil War, and that Southern Sates didn't like celebrating a Union Holiday which reminded them of their greatest defeats. He went on to explain that in Texas, they celebrated Jefferson Davis's birthday and Robert E. Lee's birthday instead of Abe Lincoln's. I believe this was the first time that I was forced to see the immense power that regional societies play upon us. It really does.

Well, this year I'll bring the Invocation on the Grundy County Court House steps to begin the commemoration of Memorial Day, 2023. I will pledge allegiance to the flag. I will sing along with the Star Spangled Banner, listen to the speeches, watch the presentation of wreaths on the different war memorials, and eventually, I'll, bring the benediction. Together with other Veterans we'll spend time catching up and simply greeting each other as members of a select group of individuals who love our country and have given parts of our lives to serve.

Lastly, I'll drive to Abe Lincoln National Cemetery and walk along a few rows of the stones. I'm always impressed by the names on the gravestones, because they are representations of the many ethnic origins and nationalities who have served our country. In addition there are religious symbols of all the different faiths who have given their lives for this nation for our freedom.

It's my prayer that you'll take some time on Monday and remember those who truly have given of themselves for us.
